# Oxford University on the Trail!

Oxford University is launching a new three year scientific study of The Ridgeway. The project will extend our understanding of how long-distance trails can connect our increasingly fragmented landscape, providing habitat and dispersal opportunities for plants and animals.





The Duke of Burgundy butterfly is a species needing help to expand populations along The Ridgeway. It seeks out cowslip and primrose in scrubby chalk grassland.

We will begin by drone-mapping the western end of The Ridgeway this summer – a drone will be flown 50 metres above the Trail to film a birds-eye view. This will give us an unprecedented and up-to-date view of semi-natural habitats and land-use along The Ridgeway and allow us to identify hedgerows and trees of significant conservation value.

This project has been made possible by an award from Mr and Mrs J A Pye's Charitable Settlement which will support a new DPhil student in the Department of Plant Sciences, under the supervision of Dr Lindsay Turnbull. The student will start this October and his first task will be to select species of plants and animals to focus on. Selection will be based on characteristics such as rarity and dispersal abilities, but species valued by people are also of interest.

Over the longer term, this research will help The Ridgeway Partnership, landowners and others to manage The Ridgeway so that it is rich with wildlife.

The Ridgeway is an 87 mile (139km) signed trail open to the public to enjoy walking, cycling, horseriding and events in attractive countryside.


The route lies to the west of London, passing over the chalk hills of the Chilterns AONB and North Wessex Downs AONB, taking in rural villages and market towns. Visitors come from near and far, including tourists from the United States and Europe, and are served by numerous local accommodation providers, shops, eating places and visitor attractions.

The Ridgeway is popularly known as Britain's oldest road - parts of the Trail follow tracks used by travellers, herdsmen and soldiers over the centuries. The landscape is dotted with AYLESBURY historic features and chalk grassland flowers, butterflies and farmland wildlife are a highlight too.

The Ridgeway is one of 15 National Trails in England and Wales. It is also part of an international network of trails called the International Appalachian Trail.



The Ridgeway is managed by a group of organisations called The Ridgeway Partnership. Day-to-day work is led by the National Trails Team hosted by Oxfordshire County Council. The Partnership works with user groups, landowners, local councils, local communities and others to realise social, economic and environmental benefits from The Ridgeway.

# **Strategic Links**

# Connecting residents, local businesses and visitors

Imagine you want to visit The Ridgeway for a day out....you would need to reach the Trail and then you might need to walk or ride to places to eat, to nearby visitor attractions or to a toilet! Overnight visitors would need to find their way to a place to stay too.

It will soon be easier for local people and visitors to walk or ride between The Ridgeway and nearby settlements. Routes following rights of way and quiet roads have been identified by The Ridgeway Partnership as 'strategic links' between the Trail and nearby settlements. These routes cater for walkers, cyclists and horse riders, unless the route follows a public footpath which is legally open only to walkers.

Drawing on what has successfully been done along the South Downs Way National Trail, signs will clearly point people 'To The Ridgeway' and 'To the village/town'. There will be small information plaques on The Ridgeway about services available in the nearby village or town. Signage in town or village centres will reflect any established local styles. Awkward gates and poor surfaces will be addressed so that the route is convenient to use. All this will make it easier for people to find and make use of pubs, shops, museums and other services near The Ridgeway.


# Strategic Links

Over the next 12 months, the Trail Team and volunteers will be working with local parish and town councils and landowners to improve signage and gates along routes linking the Trail to Ogbourne St George, Bishopstone, Letcombe Regis, Wantage and Compton. This is thanks to a grant awarded by the North Wessex Downs AONB which is enabling the purchase of signs and gates.

These improvements will progress as funds and local support builds. The Friends of the Ridgeway charity are working with us to attract donations of any amount from local residents, local businesses and any other interested party - £5 or £5000, it all adds up! Donors can nominate a specific settlement to benefit or leave it to our discretion. All donors will be listed on the National Trail website, with major donors mentioned in our promotional work. Local pubs, cafes, visitor attractions and hotels benefitting from the custom of Ridgeway visitors are also invited to help cover the costs of ongoing maintenance of the strategic links by paying for long term advertising on our website.

Other settlements near to The Ridgeway will be addressed once work is complete on this first phase of the Strategic Links Project.

# Caring for The Ridgeway.....

The Ridgeway is a great place to enjoy the countryside and in difficult economic times, it is a welcome <u>free</u> day out! However, have you ever wondered where the money comes from to fix the potholes and broken gates, refresh faded signs, produce information boards......?

And **imagine** what improvements we could make <u>if we had</u>

And *imagine* what improvements we could make <u>if we had</u> <u>more money</u>? We receive requests for better circular trails, benches, better provision for mountain bikes and horse riding, easy access routes for families and wheelchairs, more water taps......what ideas do you have?

Since The Ridgeway was designated in 1972, national and local

government have allocated tax-payers money to keeping The Ridgeway in good shape. The fourteen other National Trails in England and Wales are supported in the same way. But the economic downturn and public sector cuts puts government financial support of National Trails at risk, and at the very least makes the future look uncertain. The new England Coastal Path is also creating additional financial demands. The 'family' of National Trails have been working together over the past year to strengthen support amongst Westminster politicians and government departments. A new campaign pack has been produced to help people seek support from MPs and others.

Whatever the future of government funding, we need to attract more investors and build support from as many as people as possible so that The Ridgeway is not at risk if one source of funding or support falls away.

# ...and Covering Costs

The Ridgeway is fortunate in having a charity dedicated to its preservation — The Friends of The Ridgeway. The charity was established in 1983 and can offer support and money to projects to benefit The Ridgeway. For example, a grant from the charity bought new visitor signage that our volunteers installed at Sparsholt Firs, Scutchamer Knob and Ashbury. Anyone with an interest in preserving The Ridgeway can join the charity or make a donation. Regular giving fthrough membership subscriptions means regular income towards The Ridgeway, and this makes it possible to plan for the longer term rather than tolerate short-term fixes.

The Friends of The Ridgeway also receive donations and legacies. Ramsbury Brewery, for example, made a significant donation to the charity last year to support work on the Trail. The charity's Swire Ridgeway Arts Prize awarded in April is also thanks to a benefactor.

It is estimated that around 400,000 people live within 5 miles of The Ridgeway.



charities I am always looking for the most effective use of the money raised, SU2C are doing just that! Turning the benefits of the breakthroughs in cancer research into treatments as soon as possible."

It may be that Bill inspires others to take on a challenge this year and there are plenty of organised fundraising events to support and guide people through the experience. If you are new to this sort of thing, being part of these events means you have the reassurance of information packs and, on the day, pitstops with water and First Aiders on hand! There are lots of opportunities every year, with numerous running, walking and cycling events on The Ridgeway. Some are long-established, such as the MacMillan Castles Bike Ride which is in its 21<sup>st</sup> year, and there are newer events such as SENSE's Ridgewalk.

We have created, for the first time, a calendar setting out the major Ridgeway events for the year ahead— see opposite page. See if there is something to suit you!

Events on The Ridgeway raise money for all sorts of causes, from global to local issues. For example, a school in Moulsford holds an annual cycling event and in May there was a walking event to improve a pre-school in Ramsbury. 
